1 2 So those of you who attended the Strategic 3 Implementation Committee meeting about a week ago know it was announced there, and I think 4 5 it's been in the paper, that your former 6 colleague on the board, Dane Grey, resigned as 7 of October 5th. So at this point, he is no 8 longer a member of the DIA board. And we sent him some correspondence about what happens upon 9

10 termination, and so I'm going to use this as an opportunity to mention to you that you have one 11 12 of our first standard operating procedure

13 It is contemplating implementation of the parking strategy, almost in its entirety, 14 including implementation of the adoption of 15 meters and residential parking in San Marco, 16 17 Riverside, Avondale, areas outside of the downtown boundary where we do not currently

18 19 have paid parking meters.

You will recall that parking strategy 20 21 contemplated the fact that our parking meter 22 prices were substantially lower than they 23 should be in order to properly balance short-term use of parking meters and their 24 25 availability with longer term users who should

So I have a meeting Friday morning, this coming Friday morning with a number of restauranteurs and retail brokers and building owners to talk about those real numbers and understand those real costs and talk to the restaurant operators about what are the impediments, what would it take to make them

come downtown. So we'll know more after that. 15 16 What I can tell you is that we have almost \$3 million available in Northbank Retail 17 Enhancement that is available for us to adopt 18 19 this. I think we can put together a comprehensive package that may be enough to generate that high interest in those areas. So that's what's going to be coming to you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any more comments on that particular matter?

BOARD MEMBER WORSHAM: That's exciting. THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

MS. BOYER: Okay. We have a Governance meeting coming up at the end of the month. For those of you who are on the Governance Committee, I'm going to be sending out a memo to you with a few ideas, but I want to throw out some things about structure that I want you to think about in the meantime.

The chair is currently serving on committees by assignment, but pursuant to the 9 10 bylaws the chair is an ex-officio member of every committee and the chair can make up a 11 quorum and the chair can vote. So maybe we should not have the chair assigned to a 13 committee, but the chair helps to fill in when 14 we don't have a quorum so that we can make this 15 work. That would be another thing to talk 16 17 about.

I think the Budget Committee and Governance Committee only meet once or twice a year. I would like to see Budget meet at least twice a year, but those two are not as intensive as what you're going to see right now in both Retail and Strategic Implementation.

So Retail has this initiative that I'm working on to develop and vet, and I think that Diane M. Tropia, Inc., Post Office Box 2375, Jacksonville, FL 32203 (904) 821-0300

will take some time over the next several months.

3 Strategic Implementation has the parking strategy to discuss, but I think we will be seeing a First Baptist strategy come forward. We also have the update to the BID and CRA 6 7 plan. We have our two-way street 8 implementation. And we have a number of significant RFPs coming up. 9

Right at the moment, those all go to Strategic Implementation. I think that's too 12 much. I just really -- realistically, with your time commitments I don't know if it can happen, so I'm going to suggest perhaps a new 14 committee on property dispositions and that we 15 take the property dispositions out of Strategic Implementation and have a separate committee.

None of this has to do with who's on what committee. We can figure that awhile and you can volunteer and make those choices as you wish. I'm just trying to manage workload and the amount of time that each person has to devote.

2 THE CHAIRMAN: Historic Preservation and 3 Revitalization Trust Fund.

MS. BOYER: Okay. So I handed out to everyone a memorandum. And a couple of you asked me about this when we talked earlier, so I wanted to officially explain where I am and why I am where I am with respect to the Historic Preservation Trust Fund.

As you know, the fund was -- there is a separate Downtown Trust Fund that is designed to facilitate grants for, or loans for adaptive reuse projects. And I definitely think those are important to us and something that we want to encourage and see happen to the maximum degree possible. I mean, this is not at all a thought that those buildings are not important. I think they are very important to us, but what I wanted to point out to you is some of the language as it exists or what the process is right now in the ordinance code and how it relates to the cash balance in the fund.

So the first thing that is important to know is that any Historic Preservation Trust Fund grant over \$50,000 has to go to City

jobs, then the funding is provided.

2 We've treated the Historic Preservation Trust Fund much the same way in recent years, which is by saying that it didn't make sense to put cash aside and encumber it for a project that may or may not happen, and it certainly won't be needed for two, three, four years 7 between the time they're up front acquiring the 8 property, making that decision, and the time 9 10 they've actually finished and completed construction. 11

So the process that we've followed since 2017 is that, when we bring a -- a project comes to us for approval. We approve and recommend a grant. That grant then goes to City Council for approval. If City Council approves and recommends the grant, we enter into the documentation, but the funding is not provided until the work is completed and they are going to be eligible for funding.

So we're not going back and saying, okay, now this million and a half that you agreed to three years ago, set it aside, we're coming back in the year that we need it and saying we're going to need this million and a half

Council for approval, grant or loan. So if it is over \$50,000, it goes to City Council. So

from a process standpoint, whether the funds 3

need to be appropriated when it goes to City 4

Council is a little irrelevant because you've 5

got to go to City Council to approve the loan 6

7 or grant in the first place, even if the money

8 was sitting there. So that's the first thing I

want to point out. 9

> The second thing that I want to point out is, from a use standpoint, Historic

12 Preservation grants are paid at the end of the

project, after all the work is done and 13

certified to be compliant with the Department 14

of Interior standards, signed off by the 15

Historic Preservation division on each 16

17 reimbursement allocation, just like we do with

our other economic development incentives in 18

19 the City. When we do a grant for a business

that's coming into town, we don't set aside the 20

21 money the day the council approves that grant

22 because that company may or may not decide to

23 come here. They may decide to go to Texas

instead or something. But the reality is, at

the time they come and once they create those

So that's the process that we follow. 2

My fear of any number, whatever number one would pick, as a partial funding in the trust fund is -- first of all, if you put the cash in it today it's going to be encumbered for the previously allocated projects. Aaron Bowman to discuss some initiatives that

4 he was bringing forth. One of them happened to be something which was akin to the work I was

doing on resiliency, so we decided, through the 6

7 meeting --

8 Mr. Carlucci apparently was the one who 9 co-sponsored the Historic Preservation project 10 back in 2002, so it was close to his heart. He had offered it as a first-year initiative, at 11 which time he mentioned that he was going to be 12 putting forth a bill to fund what we understood 13 14 to be -- what was to be due, if you will, in 15 this calendar fiscal year. So that's where the 1.5 number came from, is what was anticipated 16 17 based upon what had been committed.

The auditor report, it does -- I think somewhere in the neighborhood of \$7 million has already been, quote-unquote, committed through this fund, and that money didn't exist. In his mind, it was appropriate for them to move the money above the line, if you will, into this dedicated account for that availability.

BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: So if there's no money in the fund, which -- an assumption, which it sounds -- the fund sounds like it's just a conduit. A developer needs \$3 million and it goes to the Council, where does that money come from?

At the time you need the funds, whenever that is, the source will be identified. I don't know what the source in the proposed legislation is, but the ultimate source that one can rely upon is what's called "fund

And if a source were not identified and an obligation would come due, typically what happens is that -- at the point in time the obligation is due, the Finance Department would look and determine, oh, we have extra bond finance proceeds this year, maybe that's the appropriate source of money for this obligation we have, or we have savings in our

Self-Insurance Fund. 13

> I mean, there's a myriad of locations where the administration and the Finance Department would look if there was an obligation that was coming due. And I don't intend to ever wait until 30 days before an obligation is due before we go to Council to seek funding for that particular obligation.

In this case, the obligation that's shown on the -- so there's a commitment sheet that we have to provide to Council with every piece of legislation that structures out over multiple years when REV Grants are due in the future,

when various loan payments are due, all kinds

of things, all of our obligations. And it has

these Historic Preservation grants that have

10 identified as being required in '19/'20, I

think is not likely to be required in '19/'20. 11
