3	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Please stand for the
4	Pledge of Allegiance.
5	(Recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.)
6	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Thank you for being
7	here.
8	And for those who don't know, I'm not
9	Jim Bailey, but I hear Mr. Bailey is on his
10	way. In the meantime, we will carry on.
11	So, Mr. Wallace, if you want to take
12	things, we'll we're in the Community
13	Redevelopment Agency meeting, it appears.
14	MR. WALLACE: Are you going to call the
15	meeting to order?
16	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: I think I've already
17	done that.
18	MR. WALLACE: All right. Aundra Wallace,
19	CEO, Downtown Investment Authority.
20	Mr. Chairman, on your agenda, you have
21	Letter A and Letter B, which is the
22	January 10th, 2018, CRA agency meeting minutes,
23	and Item B, which is the January 17th, 2018,
24	Community Redevelopment Agency meeting minutes.
25	Do you want to approve your minutes?

1	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Okay. The second
2	one says deferred, so I'm
3	MR. WALLACE: I'm sorry, sir.
4	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: We don't have
5	that
6	MR. WALLACE: I didn't see "deferred"
7	here.
8	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Okay. Great.
9	So if I could have a motion to approve the
10	January 10th, 2018, CRA minutes.
11	BOARD MEMBER MOODY: So moved.
12	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Second?
13	BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Second.
14	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Any comments?
15	BOARD MEMBERS: (No response.)
16	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Otherwise, all in
17	favor, say aye.
18	BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
19	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Okay. Mr. Wallace,
20	do you want to go to Resolution C?
21	MR. WALLACE: Yes, sir.
22	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Or Item C?
23	MR. WALLACE: Mr. Chairman, this is a
24	resolution, 2018-02-03. It's a resolution of
25	the Downtown Investment Authority initiating

1 legislation to appropriate funds in the 2 Downtown Economic Development Fund. 3 Mr. Chairman, in the fiscal year budget process that concluded September 30th of 2017, 4 5 the City Council appropriated \$300,000 to the 6 Downtown Investment Authority to the Downtown 7 Economic Development Fund. However, they did not put it in a specific line item. 8 So we have 9 to get policy here, approve which line item it 10 will go in, and then we will file that 11 legislation, and the monies will be placed in 12 that particular line item so that we can utilize it. 13 14 So what we're asking for is the following, 15 that you would support this resolution. 16 funds would be put into a line item that is 17 pretty much --18 (Mr. Bailey enters the proceedings.) 19 Tom, correct me if I'm MR. WALLACE: 20 incorrect. It will be for forgivable loans, 21 correct? 22 MR. DALY: Yes. 23 MR. WALLACE: And then we would use that 2.4 \$300,000 for forgivable loans as we move 25 forward.

1	That is the explanation, Mr. Chairman.
2	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Well, I'll turn this
3	over to Mr. Bailey after we finish this one
4	item. It looks like, then I'm a little
5	confused here, Mr. Wallace.
6	MR. WALLACE: Yes, sir.
7	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: It looks like
8	just looking at the one page I have in front of
9	me, it doesn't I'm not seeing where the
10	money is supposed to go.
11	MR. WALLACE: So, as I indicated to you
12	just a few seconds ago, look at the third
13	whereas, "Whereas, the DIA seeks to have the
14	aforementioned funds appropriated into the line
15	item Forgivable Loans."
16	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Well, it
17	MR. WALLACE: Third whereas.
18	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Yeah, it doesn't say
19	that in mine.
20	MR. WALLACE: I'm sorry. What does it
21	say?
22	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: It says, "Whereas
23	the DIA requests the City Council make the line
24	item appropriation as set forth in this DIA
25	Resolution 2018-02-03, now therefore."

1	BOARD MEMBER MOODY: That's the fourth
2	one.
3	BOARD MEMBER GIBBS: That's the fourth
4	one.
5	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Oh, forgivable
6	loans. Okay. I'm sorry, does that mean, then,
7	our Retail Enhancement Program?
8	MR. WALLACE: No. It's a line item.
9	The Retail Enhancement Program
10	specifically states Retail Enhancement Program.
11	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Okay.
12	MR. WALLACE: This forgivable loan line
13	item is where we did a previously, JU was
14	something we did out of that particular line
15	item as well.
16	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Okay. Well, let's
17	do this: If I could have a motion to approve
18	that and a second, then we'll discuss it.
19	BOARD MEMBER GIBBS: So moved.
20	BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Second.
21	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: All right. I think
22	we've got an approval and a second.
23	Mr. Barakat, let's start with you. Any
24	questions or comments you have about that?
25	BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: I don't think so.

1	The Downtown Economic Development Trust
2	Fund was created in 2013, 2014
3	BOARD MEMBER GIBBS: He needs the mic.
4	You need the microphone.
5	MR. WALLACE: Created in Fiscal Year
6	'12/'13.
7	BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Okay. And that
8	was, from what I recall, a fund where we could
9	create different types of incentives falling
10	within a particular definition.
11	So I don't recall previously specific line
12	items needed to be attached to certain dollars.
13	Is that
14	MR. WALLACE: When we did legislation
15	should be our legislation in February 2015.
16	I can't think of the numbers right now, but I
17	know it's the legislation that approved your
18	BID document. Within that legislation, we laid
19	out some line items in which we would use the
20	5.2 or \$5.5 million that originally was given
21	to us. We had to break out how we were going
22	to use that money. Forgivable loans was
23	actually one of the line items that we
24	utilized.
25	BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Okay. So for this

1	appropriation staff has a term "forgivable
2	loans" as the line item. Just by way of
3	example, what other options would be within the
4	trust fund legislation?
5	MR. DALY: Generally, your other options
6	from a line item standpoint would be capital
7	improvements or loans, which would be loans
8	that actually repay. So we're forced to pick
9	from buckets on whether we do a forgivable
10	loan, which is forgiven over time, or we do a
11	loan that has a payment, but you don't can't
12	cross those funds over without an action.
13	BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Okay. Got it.
14	So the last question, so this line item,
15	is that based on what you see coming down the
16	pike or based on past use? Why this line item
17	versus the others?
18	MR. DALY: Through the Chair, that that
19	line item only has about \$91,000 (inaudible)
20	BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: And the others
21	have?
22	MR. DALY: About 400,000 for loans and
23	100,000 for capital improvements.
24	BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Okay. Thank you.
25	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Mr. Bailey whispers

•	
1	to me that he's speechless, which I think is
2	the first time I've encountered that. We'll
3	continue to
4	Do you want to say anything, Mr. Bailey,
5	or should we just go to
6	BOARD MEMBER BAILEY: No.
7	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: All right.
8	Mr. Gibbs.
9	BOARD MEMBER GIBBS: No comments.
10	BOARD MEMBER MOODY: No questions.
11	BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Thank you,
12	Mr. Chairman.
13	Through the Chair to either Mr. Daly or
14	Mr. Wallace, so when was the how much money
15	was in the forgivable loan line item at the
16	beginning of this fiscal year budget? In other
17	words, have we spent any of it so far or
18	MR. DALY: By way of example, we did the
19	JU downtown campus for \$274,000. That was a
20	forgivable loan.
21	BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Was that in this
22	fiscal year budget?
23	MR. DALY: Yes.
24	BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Okay.
25	MR. DALY: And we also did the previous

1 year we did 45 West Bay Street, which was 2 \$36,000, forgivable loan. 3 And, again, through BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: 4 the Chair to Mr. Wallace or maybe Mr. Sawyer, 5 in order to do a forgivable loan, does it have to come out of this line item? 6 7 Mr. Sawyer, I'll take that. MR. WALLACE: 8 The answer to that question is yes. 9 BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Okay. So is the idea -- I noticed that further into the agenda, 10 11 we have a proposal for UNF. If we were not to 12 move this money into the forgivable loan line 13 item, would that make it impossible for us, 14 then, to approve the UNF as it is proposed? 15 MR. WALLACE: Through the Chair to 16 Ms. Durden, I would then have to go and move funds elsewhere to cover that particular 17 18 expense, yes. BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: And let me -- one 19 20 last question, if I may, Mr. Chairman. 21 And this might be -- Mr. Barakat may have 22 asked this a little bit differently. I wasn't 23 absolutely clear on his question, but is 24 this -- taking the money out of the Downtown

Economic Development Fund, could you just tell

1	us, number one, how much money would remain in
2	that fund, and so that we could continue to
3	hopefully do some other things that we it's
4	not going to zero out that fund?
5	MR. DALY: If I may, you're not moving
6	money out of the Economic Development Fund.
7	What you're doing is placing money that was not
8	placed in any particular bucket within that
9	fund. In other words, you have the fund, and
10	then you've got a number of buckets you have to
11	put the money in to use.
12	BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Oh, within the
13	MR. DALY: It's within the this is
14	within the fund. This is an accounting
15	procedure maneuver.
16	BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Okay.
17	MR. DALY: This is not between sub-funds.
18	BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Thank you very much.
19	No other questions.
20	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Mr. Padgett.
21	BOARD MEMBER PADGETT: No questions from
22	me.
23	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Mr. Gillam.
24	BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: No questions from
25	me.

11	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Hearing none, any
12	public comments or questions about this item?
13	AUDIENCE MEMBERS: (No response.)
14	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Hearing none, all in
15	favor of this resolution, say aye.
16	BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
17	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Any opposed?
18	BOARD MEMBERS: (No response.)
19	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: All right. We shall
20	move forward.
21	MR. WALLACE: Thank you.
22	Mr. Chairman, Resolution 2018-02-04. This
23	is a resolution of the Downtown Investment
24	Authority initiating legislation to amend prior
25	years' budgets for the Southside Tax Increment

Trust Fund.

Mr. Chairman, if you may remember, we have a project on the Southbank known as Riverplace Boulevard Road Diet. In Fiscal Years '13/'14, '14/'15, and '15/'16, you set aside approximately \$5.5 million for this particular project. To date, we have expended funds from that project roughly in the amount of -- almost \$775,000. So it leaves us the balance of that to actually begin the actual construction.

We received roughly -- I'll say four to five bids on the actual work, on the construction work. They range variously high and then we came up with the actual low bid itself, and even the low bid was almost roughly \$800,000 above what we already have available to us, minus what was spent. So we should have roughly 4.7- left to spend. And the bid probably came in -- I'd say, roughly, about -- almost right back at that 5.5-.

So to make up the shortfall, I need to move funds around to cover this particular shortfall in order to get that project underway and have it fully funded. You cannot start the project unless it is fully funded. So what I'm

proposing to do is the following:

I'm going to take funds from -- we have some unappropriated interest earnings on the \$5.5 million. That's roughly about \$194,000. Going to take funds out of our Southbank REP program, roughly about 172,000. Going to take funds out of parking, roughly 277,000. And take 156,000, approximately, out of our Professional Services line items on the -- from the Southside TID. And that should give us roughly the total we need, which is roughly almost \$799,000.

I'll seek to replace and replenish these accounts when we go through the budget process later on this year, when we make a recommendation for next fiscal year's budget, but the immediate need is to get this particular project funded and to move forward.

Mr. Chairman, I'm open to any questions you may have.

VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: All right. Thank you, Mr. Wallace.

If I could, so we can discuss this, could I have a motion to approve?

1	BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: So moved.
2	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Second?
3	BOARD MEMBER MOODY: Second.
4	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Mr. Gillam, let's
5	start with you.

7	here originally when this project was approved.
8	I don't think I've got any questions other
9	than, how does there's a reference to in
10	the SB REP column, at the (inaudible) project,
11	why is there a relation between this change and
12	that particular project?
13	MR. WALLACE: So what I'm doing there
14	is Dogtopia has come in to talk to us about
15	an REP application. So I'm going to make sure
16	I reserve funding to take care of that and take
17	the balance right now to fund this particular
18	shortfall. And then when we do the budget
19	starting in we'll probably have our budget
20	hearing, as a board, probably somewhere in
21	April, May. I'll seek to replenish that
22	Southbank REP program with this 172- that I've
23	got to remove today.
24	BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: So that reference
25	only assures that by approving this, we're

I just 23 wanted to make sure we were looking out for that issue in case it arose. 2.4 25 No further questions from me.

18	to that funding that we've set aside for the
19	District, historically will this have any
20	impact?
21	MR. WALLACE: No.
22	BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Those dollars will
23	still be available? Because I think
24	MR. WALLACE: I did not touch any funds
25	allocated to the Southside JEA to the JEA

Southside Generating Station.

BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: And so the main concern that I have is, if the balances -- and the reason I asked about the balances was because I know that we had some pretty significant projects we were looking at in regards to the Southbank parking and to some professional services that we were hoping,

And I understand and agree with

Mr. Padgett's statement that, if we wait, it's

likely to even be more expensive, but I would

like for us to -- at least to understand, if

this is going to wipe out those accounts, that

we won't be able to do those projects this

year, we'll have to wait until the next fiscal

year; is that correct?

MR. WALLACE: It will not zero out the accounts. I've left enough funds in there to get us through September 30th of 2018 with regards to -- whether it's the Southbank parking, with regards to REP, which is Retail Enhancement, as well as Professional Services.

BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Okay. So there is funding left over to the extent that you think

1	that what we want to do between now and
2	September would be
3	MR. WALLACE: That is correct.
4	BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Okay. Thank you
5	very much.
6	No other questions.
7	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: I think Mr. Daly was
8	working on some answers to your first question,
9	if if that's still pertinent.
10	BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Well, the main issue
11	was, I wanted to make sure there was money left
12	in those accounts. So, you know, I don't need
13	to know the specific number, if that's helpful.
14	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: All right. Well
15	MR. WALLACE: Through the Chair to
16	Ms. Durden, we will once he does the
17	accounting, we will come back and provide you
18	with the answer before you vote, but, through
19	the Chair, if you want if Ms. Durden doesn't
20	have any more questions, I'll take the
21	additional questions and then we'll conclude.
22	Go ahead.
23	MR. DALY: So the REP program would have
24	the \$78,000 reserved for the
25	BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: I'm sorry. Can you

4	Enhancement Program will have \$78,000 left.					
5	BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Okay.

8	Services would have \$420,000 left.					
9	BOARD MEMBER DURDEN: Thank you very much.					
10	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Mr. Moody.					
11	BOARD MEMBER MOODY: I'm on board.					
12	No questions.					
13	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Mr. Gibbs.					
14	BOARD MEMBER GIBBS: I want to echo					
15	Mr. Padgett's concern. We originally approved					
16	this in 2014?					
17	MR. WALLACE: Yes, sir.					
18	You started in Fiscal Year '13/'14,					
19	'14/'15, and '15/'16. You did three years of					
20	funding allocations.					
21	BOARD MEMBER GIBBS: And if we don't do it					
22	now, it's going to cost a whole lot more, so					
23	I'm on board.					
24	MR. WALLACE: Thank you.					
25	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Mr. Barakat.					

1	BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Yeah, just I					
2	wanted to confirm, when is "now"?					
3	MR. WALLACE: The bids came in in					
4	December. The numbers are good for 120 days.					
5	So it means that I've got until probably					
6	about somewhere within April of this year or					
7	those numbers are no longer good.					
8	So moving forward today so I can file					
9	legislation probably later on, right after this					
10	meeting, so that I can get into City Council					
11	expeditiously. Councilwoman Boyer has agreed					
12	to sponsor the legislation. It will give us					
13	enough time to meet the deadline from the					
14	procurement standpoint and lock in the actual					
15	construction contract.					
16	BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Okay. No further					
17	questions.					
18	Thank you.					
19	VICE CHAIRMAN MEEKS: Any public comments					
20	or questions?					
21	AUDIENCE MEMBERS: (No response.)
