THE CHAIRWOMAN: I'll go to your CEO informational briefing.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: We'll open our Downtown Investment Authority meeting.

We have -- first order of business is our January 18th board meeting minutes. I'm looking for a motion to approve.

BOARD MEMBER CITRANO: So moved to approve.

BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Second.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: We have a motion and second.

All in favor of our board meeting minutes being approved, signify by saying aye.

BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: The second order of business is the consent agenda. Unless anyone wants to bring any items off the consent agenda, I'll look for a motion to approve that.

BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Madam Chairwoman, I signed a Form 8B regarding 2023-02-02 and submitted it to Mr. Crescimbeni, and it was forwarded to all of you yesterday.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you.

Do I have a motion to approve the consent Diane M. Tropia, Inc., Post Office Box 2375, Jacksonville, FL 32203

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MS. BOYER: Madam Chair, the new business might be the appropriate time for you to bring up the discussion that we had at the Finance Committee.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: It takes a village.

So at our Finance Committee meeting prior to this meeting today, we talked at length -and I'll let Ms. Boyer add on to that -- about the upcoming, next year's budget.

And the reason that our Finance Committee meeting, with a limited participation for board members today -- the reason it was successful was because we had a very lengthy workshop a couple of weeks ago talking about priorities and budgeting and things that we felt we want to prioritize.

So with the upcoming next year's budget and some extra cash that we have, we are looking to do an in-depth either workshop or Finance and Budget Committee meeting in April to discuss --

Did you want to add anything? MS. BOYER: Just to remind the board, we have the Iquana closing this week with 3.2 million coming in. We have the projected

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Lynch closing in July, which would provide 2 another 4 million or so.

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And then Mr. Parola and I are meeting Friday with our -- kind of starting out with our base budgets for the Tax Increment Districts, Northbank and Southbank. Those will be coming to you in the April meeting.

8 My concern is that there are significant 9 discretionary funding choices that we are going 10 to make in the Tax Increment District budgets, and they are going to reflect uses, or 11 12 potential uses, of those two extraordinary 13 revenue sources, as well as the actions that we 14 took today.

So my discussion with the committee was whether we wanted to have another workshop in between or whether we just could ask the entire board to make a really major effort to try to attend that Finance and Budget Committee meeting so that there could be more input than just the two or three committee members on how we expend those resources. I mean, it's significant for the DIA board to have that opportunity, and we just wanted broader participation.

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So I think the consensus was to do it in the Finance and Budget meeting, but just to really ask if we can attempt to schedule it in a way that we can get most of the members to participate either by Zoom or in person.

6 THE CHAIRWOMAN: All right. I mean, I 7 think the committee meeting would be the spot 8 to do it. So unless you hear otherwise, we'll look for a meeting date that I'm sure 9 10 Ms. Harper will send out and try to get us all 11 a date that we can all attend prior to the

12 April meeting.

Any other questions?

14 BOARD MEMBER CITRANO: Since we're having other committee meetings similar to what we did 15 today, one idea might just be to -- if we have 16 17 SIC on a Tuesday afternoon, we just schedule the Finance meeting either right before that or 18 19 right after it. That way, some of the other 20 committee members are already there, so --

MS. BOYER: (Inaudible.)

22 BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Or right before the 23 Retail Enhancement, or after that.

24 BOARD MEMBER CITRANO: That would be good. 25 MS. BOYER: We will attempt to do that.

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And we usually do. The challenge we had,

especially with our quorum limitation here,

is -- you know, this person has this block of

time and someone else has another, and so we

haven't had a lot of ability to back them up to

one another, but we will certainly attempt 6 7 that.

8 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you.

Did you have a briefing you wanted to discuss?

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MS. BOYER: I do. Would you like the 11 12 verbal briefing or slide show first? How about 13 the slides first?

14 THE CHAIRWOMAN: I like the slides. We're 15 visual.

MS. BOYER: I know. Everyone likes that.

17 So thank you to Rick and -- so I think one 18 of the things I'm going to say in my staffing 19 update is that -- you all met Jovial because 20 she is sitting here and helping us run the

21 meetings and coordinating with you on

schedules. Many of you have met Rick Anderson, 22

23 who is our new communications and marketing

24 staff member.

> Rick, raise your hand in the back. Diane M. Tropia, Inc., Post Office Box 2375, Jacksonville, FL 32203

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1 So Rick has replaced Ina in that role.

And she's been working with him on the

transition, but I would say, you know, a month

and a half in now, we are -- we're really

getting it coordinated. And I think that the

two team members that we've added are working

7 nicely in fitting in with the group, and we're

8 happy to have them on board.

Rick worked with Ina to prepare this today. So we now have a project update that is comparing to our last one back in January. So we're going to start on a series of picture

slides here. 13

> So this is Home2 Suites. You can see the January construction level, and here we are today in March on the right-hand side of the screen. This is on Park Street.

> > Next.

19 One Riverside Avenue. So I was just at a 20 program this morning with Katherine Mosley from 21 TriBridge; she was in town for that. So if you 22 look on the left-hand side of the screen, you 23 see the nice graded lot. But what you're

noticing on the right-hand side of the screen 24

25 is the foundation for the garage and actual

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vertical construction on the garage. It's now 2 being done, coming out of the ground.

Next.

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Lift Ev'ry Voice and Sing Park on Lee Street. So there was the January slide when there was a lot of earthwork going on and the forms were up for the tilted lawn which has an art sculptural piece and water feature that goes around the back side of it. You now see that it's all grass.

And I don't know -- we can't tell from these photos. There may be another one that shows you the back side of that where you can see the work that's going on on that. But this is where one of the shotgun houses is going to move to, and the -- as part of the park. And it is absolutely moving along well.

18 Next.

> And this is my favorite slide perhaps. So on the left-hand side -- thank you, Mr. Parola -- on the left-hand side you see what the shotgun houses look like.

And just so you recall, the shotgun houses are designated historic landmarks that predated us, but they were in our inventory, they are

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our responsibility, and they were really in bad shape. And upper right, lower right, you see what they look like now, the ones that we have restored wood finishes to, porches, painted,

roofing, everything. And so really happy to 5

see that. 6

Yes, Mr. Gillam.

8 BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Are these moving to 9 the park?

MS. BOYER: No. The one -- if you go back a slide, Jovial. No. I guess maybe back two? You're going the wrong way there. There we go.

If you look at the very bottom right, you can see that there are two that have been finished and one that has not. The one that is not is the one that is moving to the park. The park still has it because they have a different design for what they are doing with that facility. But the other two that are staying in place are the ones that we've done the work on.

And at this point, we do not have a use for them when the interior is not finished for a particular use, but what we really -- we were really concerned about was both stabilization

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and the exterior appearance being the real blight on the neighborhood. And that's the

opposite of what we're supposed to be for,

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Next.

This is Lee Street itself, so this is part of the Emerald Trail Model Mile. And some of you may have noticed that the street was closed for a month as they were doing work on the actual pavement and medians. And can you see on the right that that part is completed.

Originally, we had a full completion date for this segment of the Model Mile being as early as April. I'm now hearing it's going to be more like August before all the landscaping and benches and lighting and all the details are completed, but it's definitely this year and coming soon.

Next.

Performing Arts Center. So the bulkhead is complete. And what you're seeing here is work has begun on the section of the street between the CSX building and Performing Arts Center to create a turnabout -- or roundabout, if you will, but it's not round -- that is

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closer to Water Street and allows the portion of the park closer to the riverfront to be used as a park space rather than a driveway or a circular parking area. That work has begun. 4

Next.

The VyStar parking garage. So we showed 6 7 you the parking garage as it was being completed. I don't know that you actually saw a completed one, but I wanted to show you this 9 10 one because we did take action on an incentive 11 for the Children's Chorus. The Children's 12 Chorus is moving into that space and has located a sculpture outside of their door, 13

so -- that is on Main Street, so that is now

happening.

Next.

Pier 1 Shipyards West, where the USS Orleck is moving. You can see in the bottom left slide the new bollards that are in place next to the pier that the ship will be tying up to. The crane is still there. They're working on -- the cleats that are on the pier itself are the final elements. And that passed City Council last night, so the expected move date is before the 31st of this month.

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2 Union Terminal. Work continues at Union 3 Terminal. Mr. Kelley was there recently for a group meeting -- representatives of the state, 4 other offices. So they've really gotten some good attention to the project and to the work they're doing there, but that is in progress.

Next.

This is Doro. And you can see the progress since January where you now have the exterior facade all the way up to the top on the building and work done at the grade level.

Next.

14 Four Seasons. All you're really seeing is the grading and removal of the rails that were 15 on the site, the gantry rails. But work is 16 definitely in progress. We showed you the 17 fence in January, and that was all we had up 18 19 was the construction fence. Now you can see 20 they're actually doing site work on the site. 21 And when I said "the closing," I'm referring to the office building closing. They have already 22 23 closed on the Four Seasons parcel itself.

24 Next.

> The Peninsula. I'm bringing this one up Diane M. Tropia, Inc., Post Office Box 2375, Jacksonville, FL 32203 (904) 821-0300

because one of the things that the board may

not be aware of is the Peninsula is going to be resurfacing the entire building. They have 3 gone through DDRB with that process. 4

And as part of the resurfacing, the Southbank Riverwalk will be closed for construction during weekdays for certain periods while the work is going on on the portions of the building that are directly facing or impacting the Riverwalk, and the

cranes are there.

The new finish material is metal cladding, so it will have a more contemporary appearance with metal and glass rather than the stucco and brick that it had previously. So it has been approved by DDRB. That work is scheduled to start this spring.

Next.

19 And that's it. That's our slide show for 20 this month of progress, saving you from driving 21 around downtown to have to look at all the 22 various things going on.

From a report --

24 BOARD MEMBER CITRANO: Ms. Boyer.

25 MS. BOYER: Yes.

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BOARD MEMBER CITRANO: One question.

2 On One Riverside, there was -- there is a public infrastructure component to that 4 project. Is that in process yet?

MS. BOYER: If you're referring to the 5 6 McCoy's Creek construction and the park

7 adjacent, the McCoy's Creek construction

8 portion, the design is complete, the design has now been approved by DOT and everyone, and the 9

10 construction contract, I believe, is going to

be bid the 1st of May. It is in Procurement 11 12 now.

13 And the work, then, they are anticipating 14 the actual construction on site will begin 15 before August. And I don't have a completion date on that exactly, but originally they were 16 17 envisioning 9 to 12 months of -- so I'll have to see if that has changed, but that is what 18 19 was envisioned for the creek portion of the 20 project.

So that's the timing on that, which will sync up with the construction easement and the developer's improvements on their retail space.

24 BOARD MEMBER CITRANO: Thank you.

25 MS. BOYER: Any other questions?

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BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Back to the LaVilla 1 2 houses.

3 Can we work on a business plan for the two houses now that we have invested time, energy, 4 and money to make them presentable? 5

MS. BOYER: We certainly can.

7 Walter Hood, as part of his parks plan,

8 had a recommendation of a certain use for them.

And it was -- I think there was somewhat of a 9

10 music-venue-type facility, but it was also more

11 of a museum and park facility. 12 I don't know whether -- I would really

like to get together with LaVilla School of the 13 Arts. My concern with the -- I would like them 14 15 to have some cultural or historic character aspect to them in the way they're used, but I 16 17 also don't want it to be DIA's responsibility to curate and manage that. So we need to find 18 19 someone who would be willing to do that and take on that responsibility. 20

But I agree with you, it would be a good thing to put on our project list to start trying to figure out, okay, what's the next

step. Whether we do that -- I mean, one 24

25 possibility that may or may not be -- I

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hesitate in LaVilla to throw out ideas without 2 having conversations with the LaVilla community

members, the Heritage Trail committee because 3

they have very strong opinions on what they 4

5 would like to see and what they wouldn't like 6 to see.

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But I know there's been a lot of talk about having opportunities to incubate or encourage African-American-owned businesses. And if these could be locations for startup businesses that were retail establishments or something in the community, that might be something as an interim use that would make a lot of sense within those.

But, again, that's a conversation I need to have with that community group just to see how they feel about that and if that is something that would need -- they perceive would be beneficial.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: (Inaudible.)

MS. BOYER: May I do the CEO report?

THE CHAIRWOMAN: Yes.

23 MS. BOYER: Okay. From a board member 24

standpoint, some of you heard at Budget and Finance Committee that the mayor's office has

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proposed the appointment of Joshua Garrison to

the board. That is now pending before City

Council. Josh currently serves on the Planning 3

Commission. But this would become effective 4

for the April board meeting in time, if it goes 5

through the normal process. 6

From a budgetary standpoint, we talked about -- the good news is having a lot of discretionary -- or a lot more. Not a lot necessarily, but a lot more than we have had, discretionary funding for next year to start considering.

But the Southbank budget reconciliation that went through this board a year ago -- over a year ago -- and has been pending before City

Council for over six months is still unresolved 16

with the accounting division. So quite 17

frustrating from an administrative staff point 18

19 to try to get that resolved so that we can take

action -- that we implement action that we took 20

21 over a year ago. I'm told it has to do with

the transition to the new accounting system, 22

23 but at some point that answer becomes like

windows that don't get delivered. 24

The Council auditors, I mentioned in the

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committee meeting, had identified a similar

problem with the Downtown Economic Development

Fund, but in that case, they also believe

they've discovered the solution to the problem.

5 So, hopefully, we've got that one taken care 6 of.

7 I've already talked to you about two new 8 staff members we have, but we still have two vacant positions. So now that we have gotten 9 10 through the training period with these two new individuals, we're going to start the process 11 12 of readvertising and trying to fill one or both of our additional positions. 13

So that is our parking strategy and our procurement and property disposition. So those are the two positions that we have open. The one is very process-oriented. The other one is much more of a policy position that can help us implement not operationally but from a policy perspective.

The master plan. So we're preparing an executive summary of the Downtown Master Plan.

23 We are continually asked for that. As you

know, we spent years on development of the 24

updated BID Plan and all of the component

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pieces, but that's a lot of reading for anyone. 1

2 So this is a very condensed version with

3 significant graphics that we expect to be

available by May 1. But we have -- Rick and 4

Ina have been working on the text and we are 5

working with some of our consultants on the 6

7 graphic portions of that. So, hopefully, we'll

have drafts to show you certainly by April.

On a capital projects update, the --Agency Landscape + Design is working on rough 10

cost estimates and how to get the budget and 11

12 priorities in line. Some of the numbers that

we talked about briefly at the workshop have 13

been revised and reallocated. 14

The challenge was how costs were lumped in various buckets, and we've been able to work on that and talk to them about priorities. I

17 think we will have much better numbers for you 18

19 to consider when we talk about that in April,

20 in line with where we're heading.

21 But we are thinking about things like, for 22 example, the wetland habitat along the Hogan's

23 Creek frontage was \$4 million. And we were

saying, well, that clearly needs to be part of 24

25 the Hogan's Creek project anyway because you

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can't install that until that's designed, sotake that out of the budget.

I mean, there were many of those kinds of things that -- when we were able to spend some time on it and get more granular, that we feel much better about where we are in looking at that (inaudible) budget and what elements could be done, should be done, what ones would be appropriate for the CRA versus part of the CIP project.

The Hogan Street design. So this is part of the Emerald Trail. This one is significantly delayed from original projections. We had fully expected it to be under construction right now. The firm that was doing the design on this project had a lot of personnel changes and basically closed their Jacksonville office. So we are now going to be finally closing out the contract with them at a 60 percent design level.

Public Works is putting out an RFQ for a design-build firm that would then be able to take over and finish this project. But that same design-build firm would be qualified to do other Complete Street projects and could do the

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enhanced design for the unconstrained two-way street version that we're looking at.

So we would bid construction, get going on the constrained version, but we could use that same RFQ to qualify that firm. They could work on other two-way street conversions. So we're hoping this is a more efficient way to get a contractor to get these projects implemented.

But that bid process is due to happen in April. And so, hopefully, we are back with a contractor in hand working on that project again by late May or early June, but that's a significant delay when you lose your design firm.

As far as Perkins & Will, they are completing construction drawings. We will be bidding that with a construction manager at risk form. So that bid is due to be on the street in the month of May and awarded -- or April, awarded in May, with the idea that we're starting work in June. And this would be starting bulkhead work, starting work on the road reconfiguration work, starting work in the

park. And that's the one that we would add the scope that we just approved regarding adding

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additional speakers in the park with the --added onto that project.

Two-way on Forsyth and Adams. The hundred percent design and bid package are nearing completion. Again, by the end of March or early April, we will have the final constrained design, and a qualified design-build contractor could begin -- or is expected to begin by June 1st.

So we expect to have that bid -- it's in Procurement -- and have work begin on that project as early as June. So when I'm thinking about it in terms of May, we're going to have to do a little community outreach and make sure people know that's happening once we have a contractor, and know where they're starting, and how we're planning the implementation.

Shotgun houses, we already saw. And Parks is moving the third house soon. They're awaiting the permit. They had to go through the Historic Preservation Commission and ran into some difficulties there, but are making those necessary revisions.

Park Street. This is our Park Street
Complete Streets project. Bidding has been
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delayed due to a concern that was raised by JTA, but we have made a proposal back to them -- or Public Works did, and we are

awaiting a response on that.

I will say that what this has brought to light, generally, is the long-term consequences and obligations of grants and whether those grants prevent us from being responsive to development activities and really implementing our plan as we move forward.

So we're -- we're being much more sensitive to that right now. We learned last week that bus shelters have a 70-year useful life span, which is somewhat crazy. But if they're grant-funded, then you're not supposed to move them or touch them for 70 years, which, you know, obviously doesn't make sense as the buildings behind them change.

The Liberty Street bike lanes. The design is underway. They still may require additional funding.

Southbank Riverwalk enhancements and design. The meeting to discuss the final plans and phasing is scheduled for March 20th. The purpose of the meeting is to finalize phasing

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so we can move into a Notice to Proceed on the

- 60 percent plans. Based on critical path, it 2
- should take 60 days to develop the 60 percent 3
- plans. And then following that, we'll decide 4
- whether we're going design-build or whether we 5
- 6 are completing and going to -- but the funding
- 7 we approved today is going to cover us to move
- 8 forward with that.

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need.

Banners for the Southbank. We are experiencing a delay on delivery from China of the banner arms. And as a result, we do not have the Southbank banners up yet, but we are

expecting them soon. We met with -- Gary Monahan, the employee on loan to Parks, and -- last night, in fact -on the initial programming implementation efforts and obstacles. So I will say, you may have heard, we have yoga on the lawn, and then starting two weeks ago, we started Zumba classes. So yoga is now moved to -- yoga used to be in Riverfront Plaza; yoga has now moved to Gefen. And every Tuesday we're having Zumba

23 classes that the Y is running in Riverfront

Plaza. They are very excited. They had 88 24

people register for last night and 56 showed,

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which is a really good turnout on that kind of a registration. But they are very pleased with the numbers they were getting.

And then Gary has also been working with a social sports league that has been doing weekend programming. But they are going to add a games night on Fridays. And by the end of this calendar year, his expectation is that we will have some programming five nights a week, Monday through Friday. We will have some programming everywhere five nights a week, and

So I'm very pleased with that. I mean, it's a -- it's a gradual process in the sense of rather than being able to find twenty contractors and roll it all out at once, I think this is probably smarter because it allows us to work out some of the kinks. It's kind of like a soft opening for a restaurant. You figure out what you don't have that you

we're building up to it.

22 And part of what we're talking about now 23 are some supplies and portable kiosks or buildings that you could roll out that have the 24 supplies in them for different activities so

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that you're not trying to have a permanent

2 facility somewhere to store those. But you

also need them available for the event or the

activity. So some of this is just being able

to have those on hand by the time you have the program rolled out.

7 From a development update standpoint, we have already talked about Four Seasons closing. 8 Lofts at Cathedral, we executed all closing 9 10 documents and closed this week.

The USS Orleck. The new RDA and license agreement was approved by City Council last 12 night, and we're expecting the move by 13 March 31st. We've been in touch with the tow contractor that would move the ship from where it is now to Pier 1. And they can move it on seven days' notice, so that is the expectation.

AR Polar. That legislation was approved 18 19 by City Council last night. We're supposed to 20 close on the fire station site by the end of 21 March. That closing may get delayed by a week or two, but we're on a real short timeline for 22 23 the closing on that because JFRD wants to be 24 working on the fire station.

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pending through City Council, going through the City Council committee process.

Trio. For Mr. Barakat, who always asks, 3 there was a Council lunch and learn that was 4 scheduled for today that had to be cancelled due to a health concern, but there is a -- we 6 are expecting there to be a Council meeting 7 lunch and learn because the last request that we had discussed would have required a Council 9 10 sponsor for some additional funding beyond what 11 our programs contemplate.

12 And the lunch and learn was designed to determine Council interest and support for 13 that, so I expect that will be rescheduled in 14 the near future. 15

Jones Brothers. Their initial request that they submitted to us didn't fit within our tiers approach. You will remember that in the BID Plan, you either fit within a program guideline, and if you don't fit within a program guideline, then you fall to this tiers approach analysis about, well, can we give you incentives above and beyond program guidelines?

24 Well, yes, if you do these multiple things. 25 And they didn't fit in their initial

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analysis, so they have gone back and are

working on that. The option for them, much 2

3 like for the Trio, is, if they can't fit --

which we're not saying they can't; we don't 4

know yet. But if they can't find a way to fit 5

6 within the tiers approach with their request,

7 then they would also have to find a Council

8 sponsor for additional funding.

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RiversEdge. We had a good meeting this week on a new budget allocation between -we're not spending any more than the 23 million we were obligated to. But it's a question of what we are spending that money on versus what they're spending their money on and some cost savings that we were able to allocate.

So I think we're close to that, and we'll be bringing a new proposal to you that talks about a -- we will probably be seeking an increase in the REV grant. Not in the amount, not in the formula, just in the cap based on the increased evaluations that we're seeing in the market in general since that was approved.

American Lions. We've received their comments from their lawyers on the development agreement documents, and Mr. Kelley is working

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with OGC on those. So we're hopeful that we'll have that -- those agreements finalized in the next few weeks and that would be moving forward

with legislation on that. 4

Right now, we have pending legislation on Southside investment pool earnings. Orleck and AR Polar passed last night. We have the Regions first tranche appropriation extension pending and MOSH is pending.

And that -- that's what we're working on this month.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: Carol Worsham, board
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to the City Council meeting last night. And, you know, you are the DIA, the Downtown Investment Authority. And I always think of the different acronyms. Downtown Includes Access. But I'm not feeling it, especially when it comes to our waterways.

So, you know, I just want to share with you, you know, I just went and did a site inspection on McCoy's Creek, you know, and it's a disaster. It is the biggest, most massive clear-cut I think I've seen anywhere.

And, you know, Hogan's Creek -- you know, we've got this gas tax. You know, you've got Groundwork Jax. And, you know, have you had any presentations, has even one media outlet -- just get the drone going over the top, you know?

You know, I'm just going to divert a little bit. You know, I live on Pottsburg Creek, and, you know -- again, I realize -- you know, I'm just jumping around.

You know, I miss the game clock.
You know, you just -- we just had the
Finance Committee meeting, and, you know,

you're going to get projectors for a building.

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You know, we used to have the game clock in here so you could just track, you know, just how much time you have.

4 But anyway, the bottom line for you all is providing access to our waterways. It is so 5 6 critical. I just want to leave you with, you 7 know -- you know, last night's City Council, 8 the strategic plan, the 1-, the 3-, the 5-year,

THE CHAIRWOMAN: Mr. Gibbs.

6 BOARD MEMBER GIBBS: I'm in favor.

7 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Mr. Gillam.

8 BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: In favor.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: Mr. Citrano. 9

BOARD MEMBER CITRANO: I'm in favor.

11 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Mr. Barakat.

12 BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: In favor.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: And I'm also in favor.

14 The consent agenda passes unanimously.

We're going to now move on to

Resolution -- Item C, Resolution 2023-03-06. 16

17 And I'll ask the staff to present.

MS. BOYER: This is Mr. Kelley's.

19 MR. KELLEY: Thank you, Madam Chair.

20 Resolution 2023-03-06 is a request and

21 recommendation for a DPRP request, Downtown

22 Preservation and Revitalization Program

23

request, for the rehabilitation of the property located at 33 East Bay Street and City Center 24

25 of downtown.

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The request includes total development 1 2 costs of 0.5 million and total construction

3 costs of just a little over 3 million. The

DPRP request is for 1,655,000 as further 4

outlined within the resolution and term sheet. 5

The only reason this was brought off of consent -- it was approved without amendment by the committee. It was brought off of consent

8 just simply to recognize that there was a 9

10 concern raised by a local resident. The

applicant also shared his response to that 11 12 concern.

And to the extent there are any other questions related to any of that issue or the resolution itself, I'm happy to address those auestions.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: Was Mr. Scott the person who wanted to address the committee?

18 19 (Inaudible response.)

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20 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Not this committee?

(Inaudible response.)

THE CHAIRWOMAN: I think we all received 22

23 public comment via email.

24 So to start the discussion, I'll look for 25 a motion, and then we'll start our discussion.

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BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Motion to approve.

I think this is a committee motion

already. It comes from a committee, so it 3

probably doesn't need a second. 4

5 2023-03-08, the committee recommended 6 approval.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: So we --

8 MS. BOYER: -06.

BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Excuse me. 9

2023-03-06 went through Strategic

Implementation. We had discussion on it. 11

12 There was no one, no voice in opposition, so it

comes to you without any opposition and a 13

recommendation from the committee. 14

THE CHAIRWOMAN: Do you want to -- the same discussion -- do you want to bring the

17 rest of the board members up to date on your

discussion at committee? 18

BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Sure.

And I think Mr. Kelley can do a better job 20

21 than I can in describing the project.

22 This is a project on East Bay, across from

23 the old courthouse. It's an entertainment

venue. It's been inactive for some time. But

25 they came to -- they come to us looking for

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some help for renovation work and expansion 2 work.

3 Mr. Kelley can do a better job explaining

how they worked through the process to make 4 sure they meet the requirements of programming.

They did -- and again, no one -- that meeting

7 was noticed and no one showed up and opposed 8

9 You know, I have some concern on, I just 10 would state, regarding how we bring this before us today. I mean, ordinarily our consent 11 agenda sets up so that we have the opportunity 12 for discussion, public discussion and also 13 board discussion, in these committee meetings 14

so we can do committee work.

16 And unless there's a problem or something 17 raised in the committee, it comes here on consent. Ordinarily, it doesn't come off 18 19 consent unless a board member who's not a member of the committee expresses a concern or 21 raises questions about the item.

That's not what happened here. We had a member of the community, a neighbor, who expressed concern about noise and other things in a letter to us.

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10

1 I'll tell you that that's -- from a policy standpoint, that is not within our policy, that it comes off consent because of a complaint 3

from the community who doesn't show up at a noticed meeting and raise -- I have a concern

about that. 6

I mean, we're here today. It's off 7 consent. We're going to talk about it. And I'll tell you, I'm bothered by the process. 9

10 And I think we should consider in the future if 11 we're going to handle it the same way or not.

12 But, again, I -- our committee fully vetted it. I think -- I thank the staff for 13 their always good work in vetting issues and 14

bringing it to us. And for those reasons, the 15

committee would support -- approve of the 16 17 resolution.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: All right. Thank you.

I'll start with other board comments. 19

Mr. Barakat. 20

21 BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: On the finances, I

BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: So --

12 MR. KELLEY: So the short answer is yes, 13

it happens frequently.

BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Gotcha.

15 I don't know what to make about the 16 complaints. I have heard from some residents

17 about loud noises along Bay Street over the

years. I don't know the source of that. You 18

19 know, people driving with radios turned up and

20 creating a nuisance for residents trying to

23 Part of my feedback is that is life in an urban environment. At the same time, if there 24

is a particular facility that is contributing

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more so than the average facility towards

nuisance and disturbance of the peace, you

3 know, I think we ought to be prudent before we

4 incentivize that.

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It does seem, though, that with these improvements -- and I've been to these clubs in

7 the -- at night. Having these improvements,

8 you would think the -- that more people will

9 come to them and maybe there will be less

10 nuisance behavior with these upgrades. It's

11 really tough to know.

> > And then, secondly, whether the reports

14 differently with the information they now have.

that were provided to us, is it really linked

to these facilities that are asking for the

17 incentives? Or were there other facilities 18

19 downtown that we would point to that resulted

20 in this behavior that was provided to us? I'd

22 So my first question for other committee 23 members: Would they have looked at this any

24 differently with the information they now have?

3 BOARD MEMBER GIBBS: I was there. And 4 I -- with the information that we received, I

don't see anything different, Mr. Barakat. I 5

think this project, with the Hardwick going in 6

7 across the street, will be a win-win for this

8 community.

9 As far as noisy cars in the neighborhood,

10 I look at the proximity of this building to our

sheriff's office, and if we cannot control 11

12 noisy cars with booming music in that

13 particular neighborhood, it can't be controlled

14 anywhere.

15 BOARD MEMBER SAOUD: I tend to agree with

16 Mr. Gibbs, you know. And I also agree with

Mr. Barakat's comments. 17

I think with the improvements and

19 everything happening on Bay Street, you never

20 know. We don't have a crystal ball, but more

21 likely than not, you know, the entire area will

22 be uplifted and some of these issues might

23 resolve themselves over time.

24 And also there is the aspect to living in

25 an urban area, that, you know, it is -- it

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tends to be more noisy. 1

BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: On this subject, I

would add -- you know, I would echo the comment

that what we're looking for is urban living.

We've not had that downtown. We've worked hard

6 to kind of attract them to move back downtown,

but it's not really had the urban effect. It's

8 not had the entertainment, the opportunities

9 that generally people look for in an urban

10 setting. Go to Nashville, go to New Orleans,

11 New York, go to Tampa. I mean, downtown is

12 more lively, is louder. And if that's not what

13 you're looking for, you don't look for urban

14 living.

15 The fact that one person complained about

16 it and apparently has been a thorn in the side

17 of the owner, I don't think that changes my

opinion about this project at all. I think 18

19 that the response from -- we received from the

20 owner and, frankly, the attachment which

21 reflected comments from other owners within the

22 Berkman, I think, you know, celebrates that 23 concept.

24 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Mr. Citrano.

25 BOARD MEMBER CITRANO: I, unfortunately,

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did not attend the committee meeting. I was 2 not on that committee, but I am in favor of the 3 project.

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I do agree with Mr. Gillam's initial comment relative to procedure, and then I also agree with Mr. Gibbs and Mr. Saoud, so I'm in favor.

8 THE CHAIRWOMAN: All right. Does anyone 9 have any other comments or questions?

BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: My only last comment is, I think we only received one feedback from one resident; is that correct?

THE CHAIRWOMAN: That would be via email today, yes.

BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Just for the record, I think if it was a series of complaints from many residents, it would be one thing. But I agree with other committee members, one complaint is not enough given the potential gain that we get as a city for these

improvements, so I will support it. THE CHAIRWOMAN: Well, I know Bay Street 23 has been designated as an entertainment corridor for a long time, and I think these 24 problems are probably -- or issues. I think

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it's not just noise; maybe there are other 1 issues that's cited that's probably going to persist, and it's an enforcement and an 3 operator issue as well. 4

THE CHAIRWOMAN: Mr. Citrano. 13

THE CHAIRWOMAN: Mr. Barakat.

BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: In favor. 16

17 THE CHAIRWOMAN: I'm in favor as well.

18 So the motion -- 2023-03-06 passes.

19 Next item on our agenda is

Resolution 2023-06-07 [sic], the Ambassador 20

21 Hotel extension.

22 MR. KELLEY: Madam Chair,

Resolution 2023-03-07 is brought before the

board today. Unless Mr. Chair of the Strategic

Implementation Committee would like to speak to 25

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why it's brought here, I can go into that

2 detail.

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3 BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Mr. Kelley, I'm sure

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you would do a better job than I would do.

MR. KELLEY: Sorry to jump the gun on 5 6 that, but I appreciate it, both comments.

7 So this is -- this was brought to the

8 Strategic Implementation Committee that

ultimately deferred to the board to bring this 9 10 in front of the board.

11 So the resolution itself requests two 12 things. The first ask is within the authority

that's provided to the DIA board, that we 13

14 authorize a 90-day extension to the substantial

15 completion date that currently exists for the

completion of the Ambassador project. That 16

17 would carry -- that extension -- I'm sorry.

The extension would then be from the current 18

19 date of March 31st out to June 30th.

20 The general contractor has some intention 21 or belief that he can finish the project by

June 30th. But if for any reason that were not 22

23 the case, then we, as a body, would not have

24 sufficient time to further extend the

completion date, and it would put them in

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default, and a series of negative impacts would be felt at the project.

So the second request is to allow DIA --3

to allow the staff to file legislation with the

City Council to extend the substantial

completion date from the June 30 date out to 6

7 September 31 [sic], 2023.

8 And within the Strategic Implementation Committee, there were some questions raised as 9

to whether or not that time was sufficient. 10

11 And there was a request made that

12 representation from the developer would come to

appear at the board to address that directly. 13

Mr. George Bochis is here. And I

believe -- he's from Augustine Development, and 15

I believe he would be happy to address any 16

17 questions that the board might have to that 18

effect.

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THE CHAIRWOMAN: All right. Would you all like to -- go ahead, Mr. Gillam.

21 BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Sure. I just wanted to clarify with Ms. Boyer that we decided to do

22 23 just that. We deferred voting on this issue

24 because we wanted the board to have an

25 opportunity to hear from (inaudible). And we

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had questions. That's why.

2 THE CHAIRWOMAN: So is the representative 3 here? Would he like to address the board?

(Audience member approaches the podium.)

5 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you.

MR. KELLEY: This is George Bochis of

7 Augustine Development Group, developer of the

8 Ambassador project.

9 MR. BOCHIS: Thank you.

10 Ouestions?

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THE CHAIRWOMAN: Go ahead. 11

12 I just thought you were going to bring us up to date on your thinking about the 13 14 completion date and what's happened.

MR. BOCHIS: Oh, I can do that. I thought 15 there were questions to be answered, but I'm 16 happy to --17

BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Go ahead. I have 18 19 questions, but tell us what you --

MR. BOCHIS: Yeah. We have experienced, like many developers throughout the country, significant delays based on supply chain,

23 COVID, labor shortages. I mean, it's -- the

24 list goes on.

> It's not just in our Jacksonville Diane M. Tropia, Inc., Post Office Box 2375, Jacksonville, FL 32203

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projects. Our projects in Kansas City,

Missouri has had issues. Our condominiums in

3 St. Augustine, we have, you know, six units

that are finished that we can't get garage 4

doors for. So we can't get the COs on, you 5

know, six multimillion-dollar condominiums that 6

7 are ready to move into.

8 On the Ambassador in particular, you know, the contractors put together a very aggressive 9

10 schedule that has it completed by the

11 current -- you know, the authority by this

12 board. We feel not a hundred percent

comfortable that that deadline will actually 13

happen, which is why we've asked for, you know, 14

15 a little bit of grace and extension through

City Council to get us there. 16

17 You know, there's -- you know, some of the 18 big issues -- if you want to go through them.

Because it's a historic structure with 19

National Park Service approval, there was a

21 window manufacturer -- or two, actually, in the

country that make a window that meet the 22

criteria of the NPS. Graham Windows is who we

decided to go with. We wrote them, I want to

say, a \$350,000 deposit check 14 months ago for

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windows, and we still haven't received our 2 first delivery.

3 We have a delivery date on a bill of

lading that says the first delivery is coming 4 March 23rd; the last delivery is now scheduled 5

for, as of today, May 5th. We haven't seen the 6

first window yet. We've had bills of ladings

before that told us when these windows would be 8 9 shipped.

23

It's unfortunate we have no control over -- you know, we can't use -- we can't just go to Pella windows and change out. It has to be that window because it has a very specific profile for that period.

You know, other -- you know, demolition labor. When we started the project, it was in the middle of COVID and we couldn't get, you know, physical labor. There was literally no construction workers that, you know, were willing to show up and do the labor work that was needed at the time. There was no labor pool available.

23 Elevator equipment is an issue. It's been 24 resolved now, but it, you know, caused 25 considerable delay.

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I just -- I mean, I can go on and on with 1 2 the list of reasons why we have delay. The issue is -- we are where we are. 3

We feel good about, you know, the supply 4 chain issues now being on their way to being

resolved other than my caveat of the Graham 6

7 Manufacturing on windows because I have, you

8 know, very little confidence because they have lied to us on multiple occasions with emails. 9

10 And, I mean, bills of lading that show truck

11 shipments that were scheduled to go out and

12 then to be told, you know, they're not in 13

production.

14 And then in October we got, you know, 15 essentially, an extortion letter that says, you know, we know you have a contract. We know you have paid for these windows in advance. We've experienced materials and labor increases, so, you know, if you would still like to have these

windows, we need another \$45,000. 21 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you.

22 I think we feel the pain of the supply 23 issues.

24 I think Mr. Gillam has a question.

25 MR. BOCHIS: Sure. Thank you.

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1 BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Mr. Bochis, first of 2 all, thank you for being here. We do

appreciate that.

And your description fits the description I think you must have shared with Mr. Kelley because he talked to us about your problems with windows.

My concern, obviously, is -- I mean, we're going to have to go back to City Council and ask for more time. And what I don't want to do, because we are understanding of the difficulties you and your company are experiencing, is to do it again.

And what I hear you saying is you continue to not have confidence in the window manufacturer that they're going to meet their current schedule; is that true?

MR. BOCHIS: You know, I've been told, you know, multiple times that, you know, trucks were being loaded and sent to us. These most recent dates have been consistent for, you know, the last three months. Since the last time we had a delay, they haven't changed it. You know, we're -- you know, the 23rd is, I

5 guess, a little less than ten days away when

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the first truck is supposed to arrive.

When I see some actual windows on the job site, I'll be a lot more comfortable. And I think some of the members -- Mr. Kelley, I think, and maybe a couple other people have been through the property. We have, you know, continued. And we have -- we have Farm, you know, plastic on the windows to get -- we got through hurricane season.

We're continuing to do drywall and framing work and electrical roughing inside the building that you would never, you know, take that risk if you didn't have to. I mean, you want your building dried in before you start going to your finishes. But we knew with this window problem, if we waited for the windows, we would never finish.

So we've done as much proactivity [sic] as we can. Unfortunately, I will not know until the windows arrive if we can meet that September deadline. And you're asking me, you know, to tell you that it's going to happen. I would love you tell you that it's going to happen. I don't want to lie to this board. I

don't want to lie to anybody. It's outside of

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1 my control.

BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Thank you,Mr. Bochis. Other people may have questions.

I've got a recommendation in light of the situation the developer is in, but I don't want to interrupt other questions.

7 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Any other questions?8 If not, you can proceed with your9 recommendation.

BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: I'm glad Mr. Bochis is still at the podium. My suggestion to staff -- and if it's a bad one, please throw a rock at me.

Why wouldn't we, today, move to give the CEO authority to extend up to the limits the DIA has to -- for this developer. Let's sit on and consider the part two of this, which is seeking assistance from City Council until next month, because I've got a feeling, based on what Mr. Bochis is telling us -- if he doesn't get a truck next week of windows, it ain't going to be September; it's going to be later than September.

We're going to know as soon as next week whether this problem is actually working its

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1 way through the process that he hopes or not.

MS. BOYER: Through the Chair toMr. Gillam, what I would say to that, I believe

4 the reason Mr. Kellev combined them -- and we

5 had some conversation about it -- was the time

indu some conversation about it -- was the time

6 it takes from the time you adopt a resolution

7 for us to get the agreement change drafted, the

8 legislation processed through MBRC and through

City Council. And we did not want to be in the

10 position where the agreement expired at the end

position where the agreement expired at the ent

11 of my extension authority and we had not yet

made it through City Council on a Council

13 extension.

So the reason for granting some authority right now was to make sure that we could start that process of getting legislation filed with City Council. It takes six weeks from the time it's filed. So the concern was -- and then we're talking usually a two- or three-week lead time with going through MBRC. So we're just backing it up, and that was the thought.

My suggestion to you, if you are concerned about the September date, would be to leave in the resolution an extension to September, but if you want to grant the authority to the CEO

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to amend that date to a later date not to exceed, I don't know, December, pick the date that you want.

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In the event that the window -- you know, promised window delivery does not occur in March as scheduled, then we could -- you, the board, could authorize in this resolution a later extension date. So we could start the drafting and start the process through the Council process anyway.

And we'll know that by the time we're at MBRC. I mean, the actual legislation to Council wouldn't have that caveat in it. We would know one way or the other. That was -or we can wait. It's just -- I'm just worried about the timing, that we might not get it done in time.

BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Thank you.

I just wanted to say that I want to cooperate with the developer. I think -- I mean, the developer is here through no fault of their own and they're doing the project and working hard to get it done. I just think we should be flexible. And I want to encourage this opportunity, but I just don't want to go

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BOARD MEMBER GIBBS: I second.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: We have a motion and a second.

And do we have any other comments or questions?

BOARD MEMBERS: (No response.)

THE CHAIRWOMAN: If not -- did you -- I'll 8 start with a vote.

Mr. Saoud.

10 BOARD MEMBER SAOUD: In favor.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: Mr. Gibbs.

BOARD MEMBER GIBBS: I'm in favor.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: Mr. Gillam.

BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: I'm in favor.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: Mr. Citrano.

BOARD MEMBER CITRANO: In favor.

BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: In favor.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: And I'm also in favor.

So Resolution 2023-03-07 passes unanimously.

Unless we have any other items, we'll conclude our CRA meeting.

(The foregoing proceedings were adjourned at 2:30 p.m.)

THE CHAIRWOMAN: So did you want to provide an amendment to the resolution, or proceed and then, if we need to come back with a second resolution letter, we could; is that correct?

If we find out we need a later date, we can come back to you and ask for a later date, but we've already got something in process that's moving to the next step and getting that before Council.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: So this came out of committee without a recommendation, correct? So we don't have a motion on the floor?

BOARD MEMBER GILLAM: Right. We tabled it.

So I guess I would make a motion to approve the resolution as drafted by Ms. Boyer and hope that it will work.
