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Resolution 2019-11-06, which is a map up there, shows where the Blue Cross Blue Shield of Florida parking garage is going to be.

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You'll recall this body passed a redevelopment agreement for disposition of this property. It might actually just be a purchase and sale agreement, but in any event, if one were to drive by this today one would not see water, it has been filled in. Because there's a new pervious surface that's being built on it, we have to accommodate for that somehow. The chosen mechanism is the sale of the surplus stormwater quality credits.

They are still doing some tweaking of the design, but we feel that the credits they're going to need fall within two-and-three-quarter credit acres. So what's being asked of you is to effectuate a sale of up to two-and-three-quarter-credit acres. A credit acre is one acre of land at 80 percent impervious, in case you were wondering.

2 THE CHAIRMAN: Hearing none, it passes 3 unanimously.

4 Next is Resolution 2019-11-07.

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5 MR. PAROLA: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

2019-11-07 is a resolution authorizing

7 your CEO to work with the administration, the

8 director of Public Works, to come up with a

process -- or add clarity to the ordinance code 9

10 so that when we get situations like we did last

week where we sold stormwater credits that were 11

12 outside of our boundary, there's no ambiguity

13 as to how that sale gets effectuated.

Essentially, the terms and conditions that went through this board are still in existence,

but as we move forward and if we come into a 16

situation where there is something that's 17

highly desirable such as a school that falls 18

19 outside of our boundaries but is contiguous or

20 adjacent to, that we have clarity in the

21 ordinance code to move forward. So that's what

this resolution does. 22

23 Once that clarity has been evolved and we 24 understand it, I assume we will report back to

the board as to how that will work in the

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future.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Mr. Parola.

3 What is the pleasure of the board with

regard to Resolution 2019-11-07? 4

BOARD MEMBER PADGETT: Move to approve.

6 THE CHAIRMAN: Move to approve by

7 Mr. Padgett.

BOARD MEMBER MOODY: Second.

9 THE CHAIRMAN: Seconded by Mr. Moody.

Let's start discussion.

11 Mr. Froats.

12 BOARD MEMBER FROATS: No questions.

THE CHAIRMAN: Ms. Worsham. 13

14 BOARD MEMBER WORSHAM: My only question

is -- you mentioned being contiguous or 15

adjacent to -- it's not stated in here, but it 16

just says "for the benefit of downtown." Does 17

that -- do we need it -- should it be adjacent 18

19 or in some proximity or just "benefits

downtown"? 20

21 MR. PAROLA: Through the Chair, what I

22 would say is -- I used those terms, but

actually anything within the permit -- and the 23

permit kind of runs coincidental with downtown. 24

BOARD MEMBER WORSHAM: All right.

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MR. PAROLA: It may fall a little outside 1

of it, but you can't dispose of credits from a

permit if you're not part of that drainage.

4 BOARD MEMBER WORSHAM: I understand.

5 Thank you. That clarifies it.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

7 Mr. Moody.

8 BOARD MEMBER MOODY: No questions.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Barakat.

10 BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Yes, So how many

credits do we currently have? And do we have 11

12 any idea what kind of demand we're going to see

or need in the next, I don't know, decade? 13

14 MR. PAROLA: Through the Chair, fantastic

question. As of the writing of this resolution 15

there was 157 credits. We'll get down to 140 16

17 pretty quickly. That said, we saw somewhere around 200 acres that could possibly use these 18

19 credits. That said, there was an ordinance

20 that went through City Council authorizing the

21

expenditures by Public Works, for our benefit,

of funds that have previously been collected in 22 23

the stormwater account.

24 We spoke with the director of Public Works 25

and said we'd like to start accumulating more

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credits, and they want to engage their -- the

City's consultant to continuously find more

credits, if not within the permit then within

permits adjacent to it. So --4

5 BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: And then we'd have

to pay for additional credits; is that correct? 6

MR. PAROLA: Through the Chair, what would

happen is, they would do the analysis of

stormwater capacity again from the quality 9

10 standpoint and hopefully identify even more

11 capacity than we initially identified.

12 Stormwater systems have been constructed

since our last analysis and we want to account 13 for those. 14

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BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Okay.

MS. BOYER: In addition, Mr. Barakat, the 16 17 program that council approved whereby we sell

18 credits in that -- that cash goes into a

19 segregated portion of the stormwater utility

fund to be spent on drainage improvements 20

21 downtown.

22 So to the extent that the only place that 23 can be spent is on drainage improvements

downtown, those drainage improvements downtown 24

25 have the opportunity to replenish the credit

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pool and add more credits back, but that's the 2 only place that money can be spent and that is 3 accumulating every time we sell one.

4 BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Okay. I think I understand. I understand why we're doing this 5 6 resolution. There's a lot of projects that are 7 near downtown that benefit downtown. So the 8 wording is a little bit loose for me, to be honest with you. I mean, I don't think as a 9 10 matter of course you need to award stormwater credits for properties outside of downtown 11 12 unless there's a significant and clear and present benefit to the downtown. 13 14

So I think the -- I think the wording is a little soft in the third paragraph of the resolution. It just says "can be utilized in projects benefitting downtown." So I would say that "significantly benefit downtown" and -maybe just leave it at, "that significantly benefit downtown."

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20 21 MS. BOYER: Through the Chair to Mr. Barakat, one of the challenges -- and I 22 23 might ask Mr. Sawyer to weigh in on this -- is that the ordinance that gives this board the 24 authority to sell credits and designates these

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as available does not give you exclusive authority. And, therefore, our ability to

limit what Public Works does and where Public 3

Works sells those credits would really require, 4

I believe -- and (inaudible) legislation, and 5

that was one of the things that Mr. Sawyer had 6 discussed with us. 7

8 So if you want us to file legislation with

City Council asking that these credits cannot 9

10 be used anywhere except downtown, we can try to

11 advocate for that, but at the moment it is

12 permissible for Public Works and the City, who

has paid for the improvements that generated 13

the credits, to make that decision to use them 14

elsewhere. And the requesting authority in 15

this resolution is that you give me the 16

17 authority to negotiate with Public Works about

18 when they do that and how much money they give

19 us for that.

BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: I understand. I 20

21 think we can maybe table that discussion for

22 later. I just wanted to voice the concern.

23 Now that we're codifying this into a

resolution, I don't want to broadcast that

we're in the business of -- approving the 25

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notion of giving stormwater credits outside of

2 downtown. They're very valuable.

3 Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

4 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Mr. Barakat.

5 Mr. Padgett.

BOARD MEMBER PADGETT: No questions.

7 THE CHAIRMAN: Any comments from council?

8 COUNCIL MEMBER BOYLAN: No.

9 THE CHAIRMAN: Hearing none, all those in

10 favor of Resolution 2019-11-07 signify by

11 saying aye.

12 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

THE CHAIRMAN: Opposition by like sign. 13

14 BOARD MEMBERS: (No response.)

THE CHAIRMAN: Passes unanimously. 15

Next is the Chief Executive Officer's 16

17 report.

MS. BOYER: So I have a number of things 18

19 that I would like to share with you today, and

20 the first is -- so Mr. Ward doesn't have to

21 spend any more time than necessary -- is to

introduce David Ward. 22

23 David, if you would come up and introduce

24 yourself.

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(Mr. Ward approaches the podium.)

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1 MS. BOYER: As I mentioned, David's

appointment by the mayor to serve on this board

is currently going through City Council, and 3

it's my understanding that, if confirmed, he

would be here for our December meeting. So I 5

want him to tell you a little about himself and 6

7 get an opportunity just to get to know one

8 another.

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THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you. 9

Mr. Ward, welcome.

11 MR. WARD: Thank you.

12 And thank you, Mr. Boyer, for the

opportunity to introduce myself. 13

Again, my name is David Ward. 14

Can you hear me all right, Ms. Tropia?

THE REPORTER: Yes. Thank you. 16

17 MR. WARD: We go way back to our Planning

Commission days, so I have to make sure I'm 18 19 enunciating.

20 THE REPORTER: Thank you.

MR. WARD: My name is David Ward. I am an

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22 attorney here in town. Currently, I'm going

23 through the Rules Committee next week for my

appointment and then the week thereafter will 24

25 be going through full City Council for a final

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vote on the matter, for preferably a consent 2 agenda decision on the matter.

3 Like I mentioned, I'm an attorney here in town. I sold my -- along with my business 4 partner, sold my software company last year to 5 6 a company out of Atlanta, who I now work for as 7 senior corporate counsel overseeing our 8 Jacksonville office here as well as about a thousand-person business unit out in Dallas, 9 10 but I'm based here in Jacksonville. My wife and I lived in Springfield, so not too far 11

away. So we, obviously, have a personal vested 12 interest in seeing a downtown that grows 13 14 rapidly, prudently, in a sustainable way for the city as a whole. 15

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So I'm very honored to be appointed -potentially appointed to the DIA by the mayor in his office. And I know I met some of you already. Councilman Boylan and I recently served on an enthralling Tower Review Committee meeting just a couple of weeks ago.

So for those of you who I don't know already, I'm looking forward to getting to know each and every one of you. Please feel free to reach out anytime with any questions, but --

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yeah, so does anybody have any -- I don't want to take up any more of your time. I know that Ms. Boyer has plenty of topics to cover that 3

are more exciting than me. Does anybody have 4 5 any questions for me at all?

THE CHAIRMAN: Well, it's our hope that council does confirm you and that you join our number posthaste.

MR. WARD: Thank you. 9

THE CHAIRMAN: We can ask you questions now, but once you're on the board, Sunshine Act being what it is, we'll refrain.

So does any member of the board have 13 14 questions?

BOARD MEMBERS: (No response.)

THE CHAIRMAN: Hearing none, again, we look forward to you joining our board and aettina to work.

MR. WARD: Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

21 Thank you, Ms. Boyer.

22 MS. BOYER: Okay. So we have a couple of 23 visuals. The first one is -- for those of you

who were not able to attend the governor's

25 press conference and the announcement of the

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FIS headquarters, we have the video from the -that announcement, so -- if it plays and it 3 works, we will show you a conceptual version.

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(Video presentation.)

(Dr. Gaffney and Council Member Gaffney 5 exit the proceedings.) 6

MS. BOYER: And I'll share that, back in the spring, when the revised Downtown Overlay standards were under consideration, I spent a fair amount of time with Hines and Gensler going over the standards and how they would apply to this building and working through the details of that design.

What you notice is they do have the setback from the river and then they have a step up in height that relieves you from kind of the tower wall along the frontage.

We don't have a formal presentation yet or a submission for DDRB approval; however, it certainly appears that they have complied and are not asking for any waiver in that regard.

22 This illustration showed a green wall on 23 the parking garage, but as I indicated, they 24 are now planning to do the 20 foot of urban open space and add -- you know, whether it's 25

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art or fountains, other architectural features that would be visible from the TIAA frontage 3 across the street.

With that, I'm going to move to a guick 4 PowerPoint on where we stand on our CRA plan.

And I want to try to do this every month to 6 just give you a little update on progress so 7

you know what we have accomplished.

Hopefully, I'm going to get more detail 9 10 than what I have in terms of economic impact, but just so you know, let's start out with, in 11 12 the CRA plan on the Northbank there are 22

projects that were provided as direction to 13

this board and to DIA to accomplish. Of those, 14

15 all the ones you see in red have either been completely accomplished or substantially 16

17 completed. 18

We're going to pick three. So we're going to start out and pick 1, 2, 3, and the next meeting we'll go down -- or next meeting we'll go down and pick up another three or four.

The first is the Retail Enhancement Program scheduled to begin in 2014 and '15. There was 750,000 originally provided for it.

To date, we have spent approximately 537- for 25

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the following businesses, all of which have

2 remained open since the date of inception. So

3 that business plan review, every one of these

that has received funding remains open. There 4 are several others that have been awarded but 5

6 not yet funded because they haven't completed

their work, but that's where we stand to date

8 on Retail Enhancement.

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Hemming Plaza management. The original cost was 800,000. It was allocated to this back in 2014 and '15. The goals were to make the plaza clean, safe, and attractive, activate the space through programming, events, vendors and partnering, and collaborate with surrounding property owners and tenants.

I think those of you who recall what it looked like back in 2010, 2011, 2012 would say that it is greatly improved today and those funds that we expended have been well worth it, both in terms of programming and in terms of it being clean, safe and attractive.

Urban Arts Facade and Streetscape Program was the third listed project. Estimated cost of 406-. Again, appropriated in 2014 and '15.

This was awarded to the Cultural Council in

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three phases. The first phase is complete. It

includes utility boxes, bike racks, street

furnishings, outdoor sculptures. The second 3

phase is mostly complete. It's still in 4

progress. And the third phase, they are 5

meeting with us to discuss which elements will

be included in Phase III.

Here is a map of where the various elements are located (indicating). That is available and will be available on our website to show where those funds have been used.

On the Southbank there were six projects listed, including -- every one of them on the 13 Southbank has either been completed or 14 partially completed. I'll tell you, that is a 15 factor attributable to the fact that the Southbank was cash positive throughout this term. The Northbank only went cash positive in 18 the last year. And so the ability to execute projects in the Southbank was greatly accelerated because there was funding.

Southbank, Riverplace Boulevard Road Diet, any of you who drive or work over there -- I know Ron knows that all too well, so does Craig, and are hoping that it will be completed

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very soon. I'm told hopefully in the month of November. It will be a great project. It will enhance walkability, pedestrian access, retail, on-street parking. Just as with all 5 construction projects, it's a painful process.

the second project on the Southbank. There are 8 additional water access points in design or in construction. At the school board building, a 9 10 kayak launch. At Riverplace Tower, an additional publicly accessible dock space. 11 St. Johns River Park, a publicly accessible 12 dock space. The District will have both a 13

St. Johns River and tributary access was

14 marina and a kayak launch, public kayak launch. 15 And St. Johns Marina ramp is also being

currently renovated. 16

> Redesign of Friendship Park. This shows you kind of a landscape design of the redesigned Friendship Park. The element between -- and, actually, it was called Friendship Park in the CRA plan. Its true name is St. Johns River Park.

23 The ship and Ribault Landing 24 playground is between the fountain and the 25 Main Street Bridge. The opposite side, next to

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River City Brewing, is a botanical garden space called Bartram's Garden. And then there is the

redesigned Friendship Fountain, which -- this 3

is what it looks like (indicating). 4

5 They plan to start construction on the fountain by approximately March and completed 6 7 by next spring.

8 You'll note the outer ring of the jets and the center ring are the existing fountain jets 9 using the existing pumps, but the wall is 10 11 removed from the outside and there's a 12 waterfall tier in the middle. So one would be

able to put your hand in the water. Near the 13 outside edge it's more interactive. 14

15 The Parks Department has been working on that design for several years and it will be 16 part of that full synchronized light and sound 17

(inaudible), coordinated with the JTA lighting 18

that they're providing on the Acosta Bridge and 19

the additional lighting features that we're 20

21 doing along the Northbank, behind the 22 Performing Arts Center. So it creates a

23 concentrated area where, if one were on a boat

or on either bridge or on either Riverwalk, 24

you'd have that kind of in-the-round feeling. 25 Diane M. Tropia, Inc., Post Office Box 2375, Jacksonville, FL 32203

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So that's kind of where we are on a few of 1 2 the projects. And what I'm going to try to do

is, at each meeting give you an update on more

of the projects that we've completed just so 4

you're all aware of how many of the boxes we 5

6 have actually checked in that plan, which is

a -- I would say somewhere around 75 or

8 80 percent. It's a really high number.

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THE CHAIRMAN: Did I hear you say that this will be available on the website soon?

MS. BOYER: Yes. So in that regard, we have been working to convert documents and pages on our website to make them reader accessible, so that is going on. IT has developed a new City website for us, which we've been reviewing the content on to make

sure it's accurate, but we expect that that will go live before the end of November. 18

And various things like this video, I'm envisioning that it will have many more presentation-type materials available on the website for people to see so that they get more information on what's happening.

24 THE CHAIRMAN: It's important to tell the 25 story.

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Thank you.

Any other comments from the board? 2

3 MS. BOYER: So a couple other quick items.

THE CHAIRMAN: Sure. 4

MS. BOYER: The parking strategy and privatization update, at the November 25th

Strategic Implementation Committee we'll be

8 presenting the approach that we're going to

recommend the board take to determine the scope 9

10 of any possible RFP for management or

operation. We're going to make recommendations 11

12 regarding how we handle the current proposal

that you have before you. 13

> One element of that approach is to address the MPS-owned and DIA-funded arena, sports complex and courthouse garages. They are integral to the Haas Parking Study recommendations. So how we address or handle

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those garages, or don't, will determine in many 19

ways what the next steps are because we can't 20

21 make a commitment to someone to use or not use

22 those facilities for 10 or 20 or 30 years when

23 they are currently out of our control.

24 We fund them to the tune of 4.2 to \$4.4 million a year out of the Northbank CRA. 25

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So I think it would certainly be in our

2 interest to have more control over the

operation and management of those facilities,

at the very least, so that we can operate 4

them -- see that they're operated in a way that 5

perhaps the Haas Study recommends and provide 6

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7 some more efficiency and return for that

8 capital investment we've made.

Next, I was asked to provide an update on small cell 5G wireless bills that are pending before City Council. So there are two bills pending. One bill is a policy bill, that is

Ordinance 2019-770, and that is an ordinance 13 14

that amends the City-adopted standards for small cell wireless facilities, 5G, allegedly 15

to conform with state law; however, the 16

17 following changes are not required by the state

law -- and we met with Mr. Teal yesterday and 18 19

he went through the bill with Mr. Parola and I. So I'm going to just run down the list, things that are not required by state law but

that are changed in -770: 22

23 Shrouding of the antenna is eliminated.

24 The restriction on pole diameter is eliminated. 25

The increased size of pole-mounted equipment

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goes from 10 cubic feet to 28 cubic feet, and

they don't count ancillary equipment in the

28 cubic feet. They eliminated the requirement

for flush-mounting to the pole. They

eliminated the depth of the pole-mounted

cabinet. They eliminated the width requirement 6

7 of the pole-mounted cabinet.

with an existing pole.

8 They eliminated the requirement that everything in excess of 10 feet had to be 9 10 underground or in an architectural base at the 11 bottom of the pole. They deleted the review requirements for collocation; that is, put it 12 on the same -- put it on a JEA pole, put it on 13 an existing streetlight pole, try to collocate 14

They eliminated the diameter requirement 16 17 for new poles. The bill eliminates the locational criteria for new poles in reference 18 to how close to a sidewalk, how close to a 19 residence, business sight line. 20

21 So the original bill contemplated -- the 22 original City design standards asked that they 23 be located between two businesses so that you're not blocking anybody's signage. They 24 25 eliminated that requirement.

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1 They eliminate the proximity to driveways, 2 eliminate proximity to fire hydrants, and 3 eliminate the distance from lot lines. And

they send waivers to the Tower Review Committee 4 5 rather than council.

This is a policy bill. The City Council decided that they wanted more time to review this and discussed at the meeting last night that they'd be reviewing it -- sending it to multiple committees.

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It is being advocated for by Mr. Harden on behalf of Verizon, who are alleging that these are all required by state law. And Mr. Teal takes a contrary position.

So that one you may or may not wish to weigh in on, but that one is broad citywide application.

2019-757 is of direct relevance to the downtown. And last night -- Mr. Boylan, you may have to help me because it went back and forth 17 times.

COUNCIL MEMBER BOYLAN: I'll try my best. MS. BOYER: I believe the final outcome was the council adopted an amendment asking the developer to grant them an extension --

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waiver application that outlined what waivers

they were requesting. We received a set of

plans similar to a ten-set -- I believe

Mr. Parola said it's called a six-set -- that

simply showed various facilities in various

places. He provided comments on that 6

regarding, well, maybe it could be located here

or maybe this would be better if you made this

change, and we got no response to that. And 9

10 now this piece of legislation was filed with City Council, which, when we discovered it, has 11

12 a 45-day time clock running. And I think we

are, I don't know, 25 days or so into those 13 45 days. 14

Absent action, it's deemed approved. So what we're going to see is -- if I can back up to the standards that the City Council adopted a couple of years ago, they were sensitive to downtown in particular to not having these obstruct or be collocated on the historic streetlight fixtures.

So think about the cabinet sizes you're talking about. When you're talking about 10 cubic feet, it's larger than the size of that podium (indicating). And the idea was --

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COUNCIL MEMBER BOYLAN: Correct.

MS. BOYER: -- so that they could make a final decision December 10th rather than having to make a decision at the LUZ Committee next week and a final decision in November.

So where this stands right now is, if the developer does not agree -- or if the applicant doesn't agree to that extension of time, this will be heard at the LUZ Committee next week. And if the council doesn't take action, it will be deemed approved.

The request is a waiver of basically all of the objective design standards adopted by City Council for seven facilities in the downtown right-of-way. It includes -- the size of pole-mounted cabinets is waived, the pole diameter is waived, the pole locations are waived, et cetera.

Mr. Parola reviewed the actual -- so this is a very interesting challenge that we have. We are being viewed as staff that will have to write the staff report, much like a Planning Commission staff report on these applications, and provide it to LUZ by Tuesday. However, we never received an actual

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1 What we have been encouraging is we've been encouraging the 5G carriers to consider putting them at intersections with a design that we might share the cost with them and let

it be a future signal device since we only have signal devices on two of the four corners in 6

7 most intersections and they are fairly

cluttered anyway with walk signals and signs and mast arms and things, that that would be a 9

10 preferable location to putting them mid-block

11 up and down the street. 12

There's also an issue with interference with trees, and we hope to plant more trees on 13 our downtown sidewalks. So having this device 14 15 there, we would then be precluded from putting a tree next to it. So we're quite concerned 16 17 about where they're located. We'd certainly 18 like to have input on that.

19 We think that the original standards that were adopted were objective design standards 20 21 and served downtown well. That being said, we 22 are not opposed to 5G. We want to work with the 5G carriers and try to see that we have

23

this service downtown, but this particular 24 25 bill, which pretty much asks for a carte

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blanche waiver of all the design standards and

2 the opportunity to put them wherever they

initially chose, if approved by council, will 3

likely lead to similar waiver bills from all 4

5 the other carriers that are also meeting with

6 us, and I think that we will quickly lose any

7 opportunity to have any input on how many of

8 these per block we see or where they are

located in relation to other facilities and 9

10 within the sidewalk.

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Mr. Parola, you've been working on it. Do you want to add more on this?

13 MR. PAROLA: Through the Chair to the 14 board, I think the only thing I would add is 15 there's a number of these coming. We have been 16 trying to work with the carriers. We met maybe 30 days ago and -- at 6:00 in the morning on a 17 18 Friday and walked 32 of these sites, and we 19 were making recommendations on trying to keep 20 them from being directly in front of buildings, 21 directly in front of signs.

But we're being advised by the Office of General Counsel that we need to understand our parameters, and as limited as those perimeters are these waivers seem to chip away at those

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it. And three committees now will be looking

at -770, and -757 will stay in LUZ because it's

3 a quasi-judicial -- so having three different

committees decide on it will be kind of like 4

5 having three different court cases on the same

issue, so we'll probably keep that one in LUZ. 6

7 But I -- this is not going to be over soon and it's not going to be an easy process to get 8

through. And I think your comments today help 9

10 me appreciate the greater incumbrance it's

going to cause in terms of our downtown 11 12 development.

13 THE CHAIRMAN: Is there anything you need 14 from us?

15 COUNCIL MEMBER BOYLAN: Prayers.

16 BOARD MEMBER WORSHAM: What's the height 17 of these? I understand the -- how tall are 18 they?

19 COUNCIL MEMBER BOYLAN: Well, they're 20 actually 20 cubic feet, which is the size of a 21 refrigerator. I mean, these are --

COUNCIL MEMBER BOYLAN: Mr. Chair, if I might add some context, at least from last night's meeting. There's also an organized effort, both nationally and now locally, against 5G as a general health concern for a lot of folks, and they see this as an opportunity to squelch the growth of 5G in our community. So there was a lot of conversation last night and a lot of rationale for moving forward and slowing this process down, and this

I fully expect our LUZ next Tuesday evening to be a very, very long meeting because I'm sure we'll hear from a lot more folks. And it's going to have an impact on our ability to move forward. My colleagues are being very sensitive to the liability of being an advocate for 5G, which we're going to be portrayed as if

But you're correct, this essentially -we're following the law in this process. And a few changes we're looking to make -- it's going to be deliberative in terms of how we look at

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right-of-way? 1

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MS. BOYER: In the right-of-way.

3 And there is a state law requirement that we must allow them, but we can have objective 4

5 design standards. So the objective design

standards were geared toward -- we had 6

7 looked -- going back to my service when I was

8 on that committee, Winter Park at the time had

required all of them to be underground, all of 9

10 the cabinets. The pole and the antenna can be

11 above ground. And the antenna itself was not

12 particularly offensive in appearance. The

problem is the cabinet that houses all of the 13

14 equipment -- which is what is the 10 or

28 cubic feet or whatever size one allows. And 15

16 that's why the council's previous position had

17 been, you could have 10 cubic feet on the pole,

and if it was more than 10 cubic feet, you need 18

19 to either put it underground or you needed to

build one of those -- and there were many 20

21 examples in other cities -- an architectural

22 pedestal base that you could house it in so

23 that it didn't appear like a cabinet attached

to the pole. 24

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the signal apparently works best, which is

- somewhere from, you know, 12 to 30 feet. It's 2
- 3 in that range that you see the typical devices.
- They are not -- they don't work as well. We 4
- encourage them to be on building tops, but that 5
- 6 only works if you have a one- or two-story
- 7 building. If you have a high building
- 8 downtown, the 5G service doesn't work as well
- on top of the tall buildings. So there a lot 9

10 of challenges with them.

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And the carriers -- it's appearing that the carriers do not wish to use each other's poles or work together, so everyone would be putting up their own poles. And they don't have a long range. So you could have a lot of poles within the right-of-way space. So it

16 becomes very challenging in an urban area where 17 they're trying to have that coverage. 18

COUNCIL MEMBER BOYLAN: So a serious answer to your question, having a response from Mr. Parola and the DIA about the general

concern about proliferation of this for 22

23 downtown I think would be very helpful. And

having submitted material by next Tuesday, if 24

possible, for the LUZ I think would be

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appreciated.

BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: If I may,

3 Mr. Chairman?

THE CHAIRMAN: Sure. 4

5 BOARD MEMBER BARAKAT: Given the level of detail we request from private developers when 6

7 they put forth new projects, whether it's a

8 renovation or a new construction item, how do

we stay silent on something like this which 9

10

will have a profound effect on the

11 beautification of our downtown?

12 And this is in the public right-of-way.

We spent hours and hours thinking about how we 13

improve the public right-of-way and how that 14

impacts private development. So I don't see 15

how we stay silent as a board, not asking City 16

17 Council to consider our Downtown Overlay and

18

our design standards which we very carefully

and onerously try to comply with and request 19

private developers to comply with. 20

In the beginning years of DIA there were a number of resolutions that this board made

22 23 messaging to City Council, and we haven't -- I

don't think we've done that in a while, but I

would be for Ms. Boyer putting together a

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resolution on our behalf, articulating our

concerns, particularly as it relates to 2

beautification.

4 Mr. Boylan, you referenced health concerns. I've heard the same. I don't know 5 enough about that. That's kind of beyond our

7 purview, but beautification and getting -- and

8 having these things in the way of existing business is a major concern. 9

> MS. BOYER: Mr. Chairman, if I may --THE CHAIRMAN: Yes.

MS. BOYER: -- what I would suggest is 12

14 expressing the board's concern as it relates to

that we certainly can do a resolution

-770, which is a policy matter. And I think --15

my understanding of that bill is that it was 16 going to run into January, that there wasn't an 17

18 urgency on that.

COUNCIL MEMBER BOYLAN: Correct. It's going to go to three different committees as well.

22 MS. BOYER: Okay. So with respect to that 23 bill, I think we could even bring that

24 resolution to you and you could adopt it at the

25 December meeting. And we could communicate

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with you in the meantime. 1

But what I would ask you to do -- each of 2

you serve on this board in a particular

capacity of expertise. The LUZ hearing is a

quasi-judicial matter where evidence is what

counts. A resolution from the board that we're 6

concerned about aesthetics won't be considered 7

evidentiary, but if, Mr. Barakat, as you

shared -- I hesitate to say it out loud, but 9

I'm going to. If as you shared with me in your 10

11 capacity as a real estate broker, you are aware

12 that in some jurisdictions property owners now

have to disclose the fact that such a facility 13

is located in front of them because there is a 14

concern about the health impact, that would be 15 evidentiary content that would be of importance 16

17 to the committee.

If there are individuals here -- if

Mr. Moody happened to have a sense that some 19

obstruction in front of your signage would 20

21 reduce the property value, I think that is

22 worth -- it is evidentiary.

Ms. Worsham, in your planning capacity, if

you spoke to the impact on the streetscape, 24

25 that would be something that -- if the board

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felt strongly and was willing to attend the LUZ meeting and speak in your professional 2

3 capacities, that would be very meaningful.

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So, you know, you think about your own perspectives and where you might lend to that conversation, but I think those are all valid factors that the committee would hear from you.

I will share with you, if the applicant does agree to the extension and it gets postponed one cycle, that decision was supposed to be made by Friday of this week. Otherwise, it will be next Tuesday evening at 5:00 in Council Chambers.

Okay. A couple of very quick announcements.

The market feasibility RFP that we put out 16 last year, we didn't get enough bids on, has 17 been reissued, it's on the street. It will be 18 on the street through mid December. It went 19 20 out for 60 days this time. So if you know anyone that you want to pass along the 21 information -- this is not to get into a 22 23 conversation with them on the merits or not -just simply let somebody know that there was an RFP that has been published and check the

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City's website with Procurement. So that's back out.

We had spoken at the last meeting about doing a brokerage RFP for real estate services. We did not get that prepared for this meeting. I will have it for you in December because as we started to look at the scope of what would be in that, we kind of found a sample across the board and thought we needed to put some

9 10 more research time in. 11 And then one last comment I wanted to make

12 is, you know that between last meeting and now legislation was up before council, it was 13 ultimately withdrawn last night regarding the 14 addition of a million and a half dollars of 15 funding to the Historic Preservation Trust 16 17 Fund. As it has been reported -- I want to 18 make sure that everyone hears very clearly the Historic Preservation Trust Fund Grant Program 19 is open for business, accepting applications, 20 21 and we are encouraging historic preservation 22 downtown.

And we have -- Mr. Greiner with Axis has come forward, is talking to us about the Independent Life building. We are hoping

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you'll see that in December. It may fall till January. We're waiting for the Preservation section of the Planning Department to get us some information on that.

I anticipate that in December we will be 5 bringing a split of the old Ambassador deal 6 that you've already approved. It's not really changing the terms at all as to the Ambassador 9 Hotel but allowing it to move forward while the 10 annex portion for the new construction is redesigned because they're going to be 11 redesigning that parking garage and the 12 residential units that wrap the parking garage 13 14 in order to provide enough parking to serve the Independent Life building. 15

And, in addition, we've actually had 16 17 conversations with them about, could they build some extra parking to serve the needs of JFRD, 18 19 the fire department, who's across the street, 20 who has been using the surface lot. So we made 21 them make that surface lot available for 22 redevelopment.

23 So we're working on all of that, but we 24 also have some interest in the Snyder building. I may be bringing to you a request at the

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December meeting -- I have spoken to

Mr. Padgett about this -- to use some of our

funding to do a structural analysis and maybe a

Phase I or Phase II environmental to provide

the base information that someone would need if

they were going to make a decision about using 6

the property. We have a couple of people

interested in it and I think if we could prime

the pump and get it ready, that that would be 9

10 helpful in the marketplace. So once we get

11 some cost estimates on that, I may be bringing

12 you those numbers at the December meeting as

well. 13

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And there is a third historic building, adaptive reuse project, that you're likely also to see in December or January.

So the Historic Preservation Trust Fund is alive and well and there are a lot of things coming forward on it, and thank you for the time.
